A CURIOUS RELATIONSHIP: SONS OF LIBERTY AND THE FREEMASONS

The Sons of Liberty was an organization formed in the years before the American Revolution. In 1765 the British government, which was unhappy supporting the 10,000 troops that they had stationed in the American Colonies, decided to levy a tax on the Colonies. This was called the Stamp Act of 1765. In the Act, anything that was printed in the Colonies – whether it was a legal document, playing cards or anything in between – was required by law to be printed on paper that was created in London and had an embossed revenue stamp on it. This caused a series of legislative actions in various Colonies in opposition to the Stamp Act, starting in Virginia. The motto for this resistance became "No taxation without Representation." This caused groups to form in all the Colonies who violently opposed the <u>Stamp Act</u> and other taxes that had been levied. In August of 1765, the Sons of Liberty formed in Boston, Massachusetts. Soon a committee was formed in New York to communicate with other Colonies and to coordinate efforts in opposing the taxes. Some of the violence that was incited led to the tar-and-feathering of tax collectors. This was meant to injure and humiliate the tax collectors.

On 16 December 1773, the *Sons of Liberty* in Boston held their most famous act of rebellion against the tax acts. The *Boston Tea Party* had the members of the *Sons of Liberty* climbing on board British merchant ships and dumping taxed tea into Boston Harbor. This action led directly to the American Revolution.

The *Sons of Liberty* in Boston was largely made of Freemasons. Although it was not a Masonic organization and did not have an exclusive Masonic membership, many of the leaders of the organization were Freemasons. A Masonic legend holds that the night of *Boston Tea Party*, St. Andrew's Lodge of Boston, which owned the Green Dragon tavern (a meeting place of both the Lodge and the *Sons of Liberty*), had their regular meeting that night. In the minutes of the meeting, it allegedly stated that the meeting was canceled due to lack of a quorum. Presumably, all the members were off dumping tea in Boston Harbor.

We need to double the number of children we help in CA.

Brethren.

On Saturday, October 10th, the 171st Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge of California was held. It was not held in person, but virtually via a Zoom meeting. It was an abridged version, conducted under these special circumstances due to the Covid-19 restrictions. The annual election of Grand Lodge officers took place as well as voting on provisions that would allow California Masonic Lodges to conduct business necessary to maintain their solvency.

During the Annual Communication a very inspirational speech was given by the soon to be elected Junior Grand Warden, Worshipful G. Sean Metroka. In his speech Worshipful Metroka shared his Masonic journey and what Masonry meant to him. The part of the speech that I found most interesting was when he talked about how the greatest spikes in Masonic membership were after the first and second world wars. He said he believed that it was due to soldiers coming home from war still seeking comradery and a need to give-back for the "greater good". These were generations of men who had experienced horrible atrocities and still strove to improve themselves and the broader communities in which they lived. They were good men of every religion, creed and color coming together, called (but in a different way) to serve others.

I may be paraphrasing somewhat as I couldn't find a recording of the speech. Worshipful Metroka remarked that today, during these strange and challenging times, good men are still searching for comradery and a sense of "belonging", still striving to make improvements for the "common good". He reminded us that while we don't solicit for membership as Masons, we can certainly strike up a conversation about Masonry and invite a friend or neighbor to a public Masonic event. What a gift. What a time to give. Masonic membership has increased and declined over the ages for one reason or another. Let us take this opportunity now to share what Masonry has meant to us, and what it means now, with a worthy friend. Chances are they may say "Why didn't you ever tell me about this sooner, I am interested". Hopefully they will also say "I knew there was something different about you".
